WELL, HOW ABOUT THAT!

Today's golf clubs are labelled with numbers but the originals had names and the two are not equivalent. There is good reason for this disagreement: ancient clubs looked and worked differently than modern clubs do.

A niblick not the same club as a nine-iron, for example. Anyone who compares a photo of an ancient club to its modern counterpart immediately sees substantial differences in blade shape, lie angle and face curvature. So a niblick is *not* the name for a nine-iron: It is the name of a club with the loft of a modern nine-iron. It was intended to be hit with a squat, side-winding swing rather than a modern upright swing.

Likewise, a spoon is *not* the name for a 3-wood. Indeed, a spoon has a cupped (concave) club face, which is why it is called a spoon. A 3-wood has a convex (bulged) clubface - It is not the same club.

Golf clubs were given names rather than numbers in the days before mass-production and matched sets. Before 1920, golf clubs were individually constructed pieces and a golfer assembled a set by purchasing a baffy here and a niblick there.

An "iron" was truly made of wrought iron, rather than steel. Each iron was hand-worked by a blacksmith into a specialty shape, such as the Rake, Rutting Iron or Mashie.

In those days, there were no limits as to how many clubs a golfer could carry in the bag. Golfers would have as many specialty clubs as they could afford so as to cover any eventuality on the links but in the 1920s, modern fabrication methods and materials began to supplant the traditional club-making practices and the "matched set" was born.

A matched set of irons were all created by the same manufacturer, using a consistent design from club to club, varying only the shaft length, lie angle and the loft angle (with subtle variations in club head weight and face surface area).

By maintaining a consistency from club to club, a golfer could use the same swing, regardless of loft. This is what led to the replacement of individual club names by a simple numbering system for certain "series" of clubs within the same club type. Irons were numbered 1 through 11. Woods were numbered 1 through 11.

The early 1900s saw a period of experimental golf club designs, with many not proving the test of time. One of the most important changes was the move in around 1908 from smooth faces on the irons to the grooves that are used today. The designers realised that you could get more backspin on a ball with a grooved club, and that this led to more distance. The coming of the modern golf ball in 1905, which displaced the solid "gutty", went hand in hand with this.

Golf's origins are lost in history, but in its present form it is generally agreed to have been played in Scotland near St Andrews in the late 1400s. Golf as we know it was first recorded in Scotland in the region around Edinburgh (in the county of Fifeshire) in the 15th Century. It became quite notorious then, and was even banned in 1457 by the Scottish King, James II (who was preparing to fight the English invaders yet again) as golfers had become so obsessed with the game that they neglected their archery practice! Military duties took precedence.

In the subsequent 600 years, the game has advanced from one played with simple handmade clubs and leather balls stuffed with feathers to the game we know today, based on clubs designed by computer using advanced materials such as titanium and zirconia. The biggest changes to the game have been in systematisation of the rules and playing field, and the technology employed in the clubs and the balls. Actually hitting the golf ball towards the hole remains a dark art. It is as much a mystery now as it was in Fifeshire in the 1400s!
